Dr. Caroline C. Kaufman (pronouns: she/her) is a research fellow in the Spirituality and Mental Health Program at McLean Hospital with a dual appointment at Harvard Medical School. She earned her doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the University of Memphis and completed her clinical internship at Yale University/Yale-New Haven Hospital. Dr. Kaufman's research interests are in the intersection of religion/spirituality, adversity, and mental health. She conceptualizes adversity broadly and is particularly interested in the potential role of spirituality as a buffer against poor mental health outcomes. Dr. Kaufman has examined the intersection of antisemitism and psychology via experimental research. Her research in the area of antisemitism has received funding from American Psychological Science as well as recognition from the Tennessee and Connecticut Psychological Associations. She is dedicated to addressing antisemitism and other forms of prejudice via education and intervention.
