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IPAGS Helps with Katrina Relief Effort

In light of the recent events of Hurricane Katrina in Louisiana, the members of the IPAGS Committee extend their sincere support to all displaced persons. Attention IPA Student Members:

It has come to our attention that there are many Illinois Psychological Association (IPA) student members that have not joined the Illinois Psychological Association of Graduate Students (IPAGS). We believe this has been due to some confusion about the difference between IPA and IPAGS. Below is some important information regarding the difference between one's status as an IPA student member and involvement in IPAGS.

IPAGS has recently become a *section* of IPA specifically for graduate students. Prior to this change, students became IPAGS members automatically when they joined IPA, but this is no longer the case. This status change has resulted in a number of benefits for students such as holding a voting seat on IPA council and establishing ourselves as a more independent entity. By having a voting seat on IPA council, students have a real voice for the future of our profession in Illinois.

This change has lead to a large number of students who are members of IPA and receive all the benefits associated with that membership, such as the IPA quarterly newsletter, but are *not members of IPAGS*. By joining IPAGS you will pay a small fee of \$10, which will pay for itself in the benefits you receive as an IPAGS member.

Benefits of IPAGS

- Members receive a quarterly newsletter directed at students and student concerns developed by the IPAGS council members.
- IPAGS holds monthly two-hour workshops on issues relevant to student members. IPAGS members receive admission to these workshops at significantly discounted rates.
- IPAGS holds an annual Networking Breakfast where students meet psychologists. IPAGS is also
 working to establish an online resource linking students to professionals for ongoing communication
- IPAGS offers members many opportunities to develop and become involved in grassroots projects. One example is becoming a Campus Representative; this person distributes information generated by IPAGS to students at his/her graduate institution.

- Through your membership in IPAGS you become a part of a supportive network of fellow students and professionals
